SUBJECT: Solid Waste Collection – City Pickup

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

THAT Council:

- 1. Approve the collection of multi-family residential solid waste to include buildings from seven to fifteen units with placement of garbage, recycling, and green waste to only occur at the curb and in residential containers; and
- 2. Direct staff to update the Collection Removal, Disposal and Recycling of Solid Waste Bylaw No. 2084 to reflect this direction, as per Council's January 16, 2023, Motion numbered 2023-010.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On January 16, 2023, Council approved that the status quo private collection of multi-family and commercial solid waste is to remain in effect. The existing exception to this private collection paradigm is that multi-family buildings with six or less units are given the option of city collection.

As directed by Council on February 13, 2023, this report addresses the feasibility of extending the existing multi-family exception option for city collection to buildings with seven to ten units and notes the number of buildings with eleven to fifteen units and sixteen to twenty-one units for consideration.

## INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

As directed by Council on February 13, 2023, this report addresses the feasibility of extending the option for city solid waste collection to buildings with seven to ten units and notes the number of buildings with eleven to fifteen units and sixteen to twenty-one units.

The city provides solid waste collection to a total of 4111 curbside residential customers, including 3,968 units in single family households and 143 units in multifamily complexes. For residential customers that receive the city's solid waste collection, the service is performed manually by city staff, and residents are allotted per unit:

- up to two garbage containers (≤50lbs);
- up to ten organics containers, bundles, or kraft paper bags for yard trimmings and food scraps (≤50lbs);
- the city's blue box recycling system which consists of a blue box for mixed container packaging, a yellow bag for mixed paper materials, and a red box for glass packaging.

Since 2015, the city has been collecting from three buildings with more than 6 units. It is feasible to formalize and extend this collection practice to buildings with up to and including 15 units, provided that each building puts garbage out at the curb in residential containers. Each unit within the building would then be charged the annual solid waste utility fee of \$355.

Multi-family complexes that require centrally located solid waste collection that cannot be performed manually must opt for a private waste hauler to perform solid waste collection.

Due to the challenges ascertaining how many suites there are in individually taxed apartment buildings, staff can only approximate the number of buildings with suites in the categories shown below:

- Seven to ten units inclusive- 18 properties, one of which is collected by the city.
- Eleven to fifteen units inclusive 23 properties, two collected by city.
- Sixteen to twenty one units inclusive 48 properties, no city collection.

The Collection Removal, Disposal and Recycling of Solid Waste Bylaw No. 2084 will need to be modified to reflect recommendations in this report and Council direction as per motion 2023-010 dated January 16, 2023.

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### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Each residential unit in a multi-family building that qualifies for city solid waste collection services that are currently not receiving this service from the city, will need to pay the annual utility fee of \$355 should the multi-family building decide to opt into the service. It is anticipated that these fees will cover the additional costs of providing this service.

### **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS**

The Collection Removal, Disposal and Recycling of Solid Waste Bylaw No. 2084 will need to be modified to reflect recommendations in this report and Council direction as per motion 2023-010 dated January 16, 2023.

#### **COMMUNICATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS**

Staff will reach out to those properties of up to and including 15 units and advise them of the opportunity to participate in city collection provided that they can put their solid waste at the curb in residential containers and as per residential practice. They will also be advised of the per unit utility fee of \$355.

#### INTERDEPARTMENTAL INVOLVEMENT/IMPLICATIONS

Financial Services Department staff will work with staff in Engineering & Municipal Operations to register and collect from new participants.

#### ALIGNMENT WITH STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Aligns with the strategic priority of Community Foster a livable city with connected residents enjoying distinctive places and activities.

### **OPTIONS / RISKS / ALTERNATIVES**

The following alternate option is available for Council's consideration:

1. Council does not extend the opportunity for residential solid waste collection to multi-family properties from 7 to 15 units (as current status quo includes six or less units); however, this would eliminate a potential option for residents to participate in a service that more closely matches their needs in terms of price and service.

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#### **CONCLUSION**

It is recommended that Council expand the opportunity for city solid waste collection service to residents in multi-family buildings from six or less units to up to and including 15 units, be given the option of city solid waste collection if garbage is placed out at the curb in residential containers. Each unit within the building would then be charged the annual solid waste utility fee of \$355.
